

Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) Meeting Minutes

July 31, 2025 9 am - 10 am Via Zoom

The meeting was called to order at 9:03am.

- **1. Shared Governance:** JD reviewed paraphrased SDSU Senate Principles of Shared Governance and how it relates to the Transportation Advisory Committee.
- 2. June Meeting Minutes: the minutes were approved by unanimous consent.
- 3. 3 Big Objectives: JD reviewed and requested feedback about 3 Big Objects that have been drafted to guide the development of the TDM Plan and serve as the north star for Transportation Services. The objectives were modified based on the committee's recommendations:
 - Support student/employee success with safe, multidisciplinary transportation services for all: focus on lower-cost, shared, and sustainable modes. Support the strategic plan, graduation rates, housing expansion, and recruitment/retention.
 - Ensure parking availability and financial stability: support SDSU's Mesa campus
 to grow with minimal new resident and commuter parking, low/no new parking
 debt service, and funds for maintenance/repair.
 - Affordability (compared to R1, CA public peers) and safety of all transportation options: fund incentives that help manage vehicle miles traveled (VMT) and support Vision Zero in the College Area.

The committee discussed referencing greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction, but it was determined that a reduction in VMT will lead to GHG reduction as well as health co-benefits through more active transportation.

- **4. Parking Maintenance and Repairs:** JD provided an update about addressing deferred maintenance, and projected costs to maintain parking:
 - P15 Rehabilitation: approved for \$3.9 Million for Summer 2025 (likely under budget). Project includes stormwater bioretention, recycled asphalt, and EV charging readiness (pending securing grant funds)
 - P1 Lighting improvements for \$790,000 for Summer/Fall 2025
 - P14 Columns for ~\$883,000 for Summer 2026 for water intrusion treatment
 - Zura Way Repairs Study and design: underway
 - TS is working on elevator rehabilitation, which will affect the entire maintenance schedule. ~\$900k per elevator for 14 elevators that need to be updated. JD noted that all of the parking elevators have exceeded the obsolescence level that requires modification.
- **5. Parking Citation Amounts & Practices**: JD reviewed Transportation Services' (TS) goals for modifying fine amounts and practices:
 - Improve safety of frontline staff
 - Decrease negative interactions between guests and staff
 - Friendly campus environment (not overly punitive for first time errors)
 - Financial stability for parking enforcement
 - Reasonable contributions to TDM initiatives using funding from citations pursuant of the Title 5 of the Ed Code.

TS proposes the following decreases in fines:

- Shared Permit violations from \$350 per vehicle to \$150 per vehicle
- Parked over stall line violation from \$70 to \$35
- Create a new "On Street Permit Violation for Mission Valley at \$54 (reduced from \$70)

TS proposes the following increases in fines:

- No permit violation (81% of citations issued) \$70 to \$80
- Invalid Permit citation (9% of citations issued) \$70 to \$80
- Violation for red curbs, passenger loading zones, fire hydrants, etc increased to \$100

TS proposes the following citation adjudication practice changes (upon appeal):

- Reduce first-time citations for failure to correctly enter license plate to warnings
- Reduce first-time citations for failure to link vehicles to permits to warnings
- Reduce first time violations for ADA placard/plate holders that do not pay for parking from a full citation to a warning

JD noted that SDSU citation amounts have not increased since 2018, and he shared the peer institution analysis that indicates that \$80 for no permit/invalid permit violations is appropriate.

JD shared that these changes would have the following expected Benefits

- Reduce number of appealed citation
- Reduce citations that go to collections
- Reduce citations that are never paid
- Offer goodwill towards new affiliates and guests and ensure honest mistake are not overly fined

Guthre asked if Transportation Services would consider an escalating/accumulating fine structure whereby first-time violations would be lower, and following citations for the same violation would have higher fines. JD responded that TS will research the idea and report back to the TAC.

- **6. TAC Ex-Officio Membership:** JD introduced the idea of expanding ex-officio membership for the TAC. This would help increase representations to more entities, diversify perspectives, and build future voting members.
 - JD noted that TS will reach out to:
 - o Global Campus
 - Resource Centers
 - o OHA. REO
 - The committee recommended adding more student leaders from A.S. JD
 welcomed the idea and asked Charlotte to advise on the best way to go about
 adding more A.S. leaders. Wesley recommended inviting representation from
 Circulate San Diego, and JD responded that he would ask if they want to join the
 committee.
